Another previous grumple has also resurfaced. It has been brought to my notice that all day bonfires have been causing annoyance. Now that we all have green bins, I would not have thought this necessary. You can get extra bins at a reasonable price from the council. There has always been an unwritten law, accepted generally here that bonfires were only lit after 4pm with due regard to ones neighbours. This seems reasonable.

I understand that the Badminton section of the Village Hall is in crisis. This section has a long history of service to the Village, and I cannot feel that there is nobody here, who would enjoy a friendly game on a Friday evening. ## **Chairmans Report**

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

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## Croatia - A Beautiful Country

When our eldest granddaughter told us that she was getting married in September 2015 we were very happy but also very surprised when she added that it would take place in Croatia. One of her best friends lives in Bosnia and being chosen for one of her bridesmaids she did not realise that she would not be allowed into this country because Bosnia is not part of the EU. Hence she chose Croatia as the bordering country and who are in the EU and incidentally also use their own currency, being the kuna.

The guest list was kept to a maximum of 40 people and every single detail was arranged in Croatia so that they knew exactly how much the whole affair would cost, and I must add it was much cheaper than if it had been held in this country, not to mention the spectacular scenery and 32 degrees of heat. Most of the guests of course travelled by air but Tony and I decided to make a holiday of it and go by road. Everyone thought that we were mad of course. Only just over 1400 miles (not much when you say it quick) and we would see so many more countries en route. As time passed, we started to plan our route and decided we would book three hotels, equalling the journey to between 330 and 350 miles per day (a doddle on the Continent).

We had two drivers to share the load and three extra octogenarians who wanted to come 'just for the ride'. Mad, yes, everyone said so. The day eventually dawned when it was time to go. Our first night was spent in Nancy, France with a hotel we had used before. Easy journey - tunnel crossing at 6am and we were in Nancy by 4pm in the afternoon. Our second hotel was booked for just north of Milan - a beautiful journey with spectacular scenery over the St.Gotthard Pass into Switzerland, then south to Milan, passing through many tunnels and more beautiful scenery.

The third day, from Milan to Rijeka in Croatia, was mostly on heavy motorway, but we did notice that each time we stopped en route the temperature got hotter and hotter. We passed the turnoff to Venice and the last name place in Italy was Trieste, which then took us into Slovenia for about 50 miles (a beautiful country) and then into Croatia and Rijeka, where we found our hotel right on the coast overlooking the Adriatic. All the hotel staff spoke English and could not have been more helpful. The hotel was top class and our bedrooms were practically over the Adriatic, and at a very reasonable price.

On the 4th day we left around 7.30 am as we wanted to reach



Dubrovnik, our final destination, by 4pm because the wedding party were having a wine tasting and everyone wanted to be there. The 370 miles it took us was truly amazing, very mountainous but very green, with the Adriatic on our right, and 2 miles of Bosnia part of the coastline, very odd. Would you believe it, we arrived at our hotel at 3.30pm - just in time. All this was done with the aid of two satnavs' - the destination in one and the other for fuel and refreshment stops. We also followed the map as well.

Croatia is a very beautiful country, everything is much cheaper than here, and the weather unfortunately a little too hot for us. Apparently, one week later would have been perfect, at around 26 degrees. The wedding took place in a top class hotel using three terraces overlooking the Adriatic, the top one being for the ceremony, the second for refreshments and photos and the third, overlooking the sea, for the wonderful wedding breakfast and dancing until midnight - fantastic.

We spent a further couple of days relaxing in our wonderful hotel (too hot to go far) and the journey home was just as easy and everyone agreed that it would be lovely to do it all again, but maybe at a slower pace.

The following day Sunday 4th October we had our Harvest Service, the church was beautifully decorated by church members Elizabeth and Judy, and the produce from this service was donated to St Luke's Hospice, who expressed their appreciation for all the gifts of food.

On Saturday the 14th November we held a Men's Breakfast outreach event, which was well attended. The guest speaker was Danny Mansfield, who gave a moving account of his life.

While Christmas seems a distant thought now; we at RBBC celebrated Christmas with two special services. The first was a "Toys and Tins Service2", held on 13th December; which was well attended, with an abundance of items being donated, including toiletries, toys, tinned food, books and games. These donations were given to The Resource Centre in Basildon to be distributed to needy families and to those who found themselves homeless. The "Carols by Candlelight" Service held on 20th December was a great success and well attended, including by many visitors to our church.

Now with the coming of spring and summer, we held a "Musical Tea" on Saturday 19th March. As the title suggests the accent was very much musical. Guest speakers were Shirley and Bill Park. ## Lemon Yoghurt Cake

100ml/4floz natural yoghurt 200g/7oz castor sugar 100g/3 ½ oz butter - melted 2 medium free range eggs Grated zest of 1 lemon 250g/9oz self raising flour 100g/3 ½ oz lemon curd Icing sugar to dust

#### Method

Pre heat oven to 180c/350f/gas 4. Lightly oil and base line an 18cm/7inch cake tin with baking paper.

In a large bowl whisk together the yoghurt, sugar, melted butter, eggs and lemon zest then quickly but thoroughly beat in the sifted flour.

Pour the cake mixture into the prepared cake tin and cook in centre of oven for about 1 hour or until a skewer inserted into the centre of the cake comes out clean.

Leave the cake to cool in the tin for 10 minutes, then transfer to a cake rack to cool completely.

When cold cut the cake in half to make 2 equal discs, then sandwich them back together using the lemon curd.

Dust the top with icing sugar or drizzle over icing made with icing sugar mixed with lemon juice.

Can be served with Greek yoghurt or crème fraiche if wished. Cake will freeze but is best decorated after defrosting.

#### Parish Council

Saving Lives

Following the training of over 80 volunteers from many of the clubs that meet at the Village Hall, together with residents from Ramsden Bellhouse and surrounding villages, the defibrillator has now been positioned in its case on the wall of the Village Hall facing the shop.

If in the case of an emergency it should be necessary to access the defibrillator, the unlock code will be provided to you by the ambulance services when a 999 call is made to the Emergency Services.

#### Crime

As many of you will be aware there has been a number of vehicles that have been broken into throughout the village with items being stolen. At the time of writing there are reports that further thefts have taken place. As most of the thefts have taken place in the early hours, please ensure all valuables are removed from your vehicles.





#### Planning

Following a planning meeting on 25th February in the Village Hall which was attended by over 150 residents, Basildon Council presented details of The Local Plan and how it related to Ramsden Bellhouse. The Local Plan proposal was for 45 homes to be added to the village being located in sites in Ramsden Park Road and Orchard Avenue.

The concern from the majority of those attending was that any mini estate anywhere in the village would potentially encourage some land owners to put forward further sites and pave the way for mini estates to be created throughout the village in the future.

Following a vote from those residents that attended the meeting, on whether they would prefer mini estates or rather use infill throughout the village, the show of hands was for the latter. The Parish Council in conjunction with representatives from the Street Action Groups will investigate if the proposed option is achievable, whilst continuing the conversation with Basildon Council as to the concerns voiced on the 'planned over development' in some parts of the village, mindful that the final date for submissions is the 24th March.

Residents attending were reminded that each of them needed to communicate their thoughts and views with regard to the Local Plan to Basildon in writing as per the details and instructions contained within Basildon Diary publication which was supplied to each household.

For those residents that had not been able to attended the meeting, It was agreed that they would be made aware of the result of the vote that majority attending had made and that the information regarding the closing date would be provided to each household, in order that they can respond and make their own judgement as to their preferred way forward.

Given the date of this publication is after the closing date, any further information and updates will be communicated via e mail to those residents that have registered their e mail address with the Parish Council and on RBPC Notice Board and web site.

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#### **Edible Hedges**

In spring, the hedgerows at home look glorious and well worth the tough spadework of digging in hedging plants over the past few winters. The blackthorn and the hawthorn produce sprays of creamy white flowers - and then by June the branches are entwined with honeysuckle and wild roses. Sheltering under the fresh green leaves are primroses, wild violets and later foxgloves. By autumn, the colours of the hedgerows will change again and, by watching this change, I can follow the course of the seasons.

The hedges are certainly beautiful, but they do have a practical purpose, too, because they're edible. These hedges are planted to provide me with food and drink throughout the year. In May, I'll pick the young beech leaves to make a lovely liquor called beech leaf noyau (where the beech leaves are mixed with gin and brandy). This will be ready to drink a few weeks later, just in time for watching Wimbledon. In early summer, I'll gather elderflowers to make elderflower fritters and elderflower wine (the best country wine of all) and bubbly elderflower champagne. In autumn, I'll collect elderberries for wine and sloes for sloe gin (this treat, bottled in late September, will be ready for Christmas). I'll also pick blackberries for blackberry gin, blackberry vinegar (a salad dressing), bramble jelly and best of all I'll eat the berries fresh in a dessert. Autumn, too, sees the branches heavy with hips and haws for a delicious hedgerow jelly.

I'll gather some of the plants growing under the hedgerows, too, such as wild garlic and Jack-by-the-Hedge for salads, and maybe this year (although I've never fancied trying nettles in anything), I might attempt some nettle beer. It's come highly recommended!

It's not only me who'll benefit from a hedgerow harvest; as the local wildlife benefits as well. The hedges will supply caterpillars, other insects and berries for so many songbirds here. They'll also provide nest sites and shelter for them, and shelter for mammals such as dormice and hedgehogs (it's no surprise that when the hedges declined on farmland the hedgehogs did too - the clue is in their name, after all). In the UK, our hedgerows are the principle habitat for around 50 existing species of conservation concern and provide vital wildlife corridors for them.

The hedges will also feed different insects including crucial pollinators. Among these are my honeybees. There's something for them in hedges from the hazel catkins in early spring through the season of blossoms to ivy in the autumn.

As well as planting new hedges, I've been looking after the old hedgerows here, too. Many old hedgerows are the last markers of the

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ancient woodland that once covered this area, and as such they're known as assart hedges or a 'woodland ghost'. Practically, I need both the old and new hedges here to help soak up water (and help prevent flooding), act as windbreaks, absorb sound and pollution and purify the air around my home.

I really can't do without them.
